Executive Summary

Engagement Overview

Offchain Labs engaged Trail of Bits to review the security of the changes adding support for Geth 14.4 for the go-ethereum fork used in ArbOS. These changes correspond to revisions made in [53f5c56](#) (Nitro) and [b6f989a](#) (go-ethereum).

The commits in scope involve a number of upstream changes related to Geth 14.4 support as well as Arbitrum-specific changes, including support for preimage recording, cache and database improvements, and other minor changes. Only potential consensus-related changes were in scope. These were determined by the two diff files provided by Offchain Labs showing changes impacting the replay executable: one by line intersections and one by hunk intersections.

One consultant conducted the review from February 5 to February 10, 2025, for a total of four engineer-days of effort. With full access to source code and documentation, we performed a manual review of the code in scope.

Observations and Impact

This engagement did not reveal any issues in the code in scope. However, we provide some recommendations for improving the code quality in the [Code Quality Recommendations appendix](#).

Recommendations

Based on the security review, Trail of Bits recommends that Offchain Labs take the following step:

- Review the items in the [Code Quality Recommendations appendix](#) and consider taking action on each one.

A. Code Quality Recommendations

The following is a list of findings that were not identified as immediate security issues but may warrant further investigation.

- Consider adding additional documentation on changes that could affect consensus. While a number of the upstream Geth 14.4 changes should not affect consensus, these changes were tested only on the Ethereum mainnet, without considering Arbitrum-specific assumptions. In particular, from the `state_transition` changes in scope, the following changes need to be documented:
 - The `coinbase/tip` address was changed since the tip is always zero.
 - The `msg.value` balance addition was moved outside the `st.msg.GasFeeCap != nil` check (e.g., make sure that the `else` branch is never used).
